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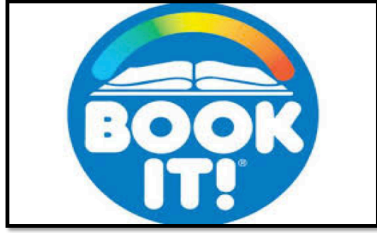

## A Reader's Notebook Should Contain...

- Space to write about themselves as a reader
- Space to keep track of books read and to be read
- Space to reflect on their thinking related to books they have read
- Space to use the learning from their mini-lessons as it applies to the books they are reading
- Space to keep some notes from mini-lessons
- Authentic (kid-created) responses to reading and about reading

Classrooms that use Writer's Workshop understand that for students to write best they need to be writing on topics of their **own choosing**.

Writer's Notebooks support teachers in their quest to have students who know what to write about!

## **What is a Writer's Notebook?**

A writer's notebook is not a diary or a journal! But rather a place to hold onto ideas for writing! A place to write down what you noticed and don't want to forget. A writer's notebook gives you a place to **live like a writer**.

**Writer's Notebooks give students the opportunity to live and act just like “real” writers.**

The notebook can work as a scrapbook to collect important relics from your life or as a container to hold all the beautiful writing you collect and all the ideas you have for writing about yourself.

### **Writer's Notebooks...**

- Provide a reason and a place to hold onto new and neat ideas for writing.
- Gives students a place where writing matters to them.
- Develops a love of writing and an authentic way of thinking and living like a writer! Always looking for the next idea!
- Create excitement in the act of collecting ideas for writing that hold personal meaning for your students.
- Provide a place for a writer to practice a new skill related to writing or a place to practice writing related to a specific genre.

## Top 10 Things to Put in a Writer's Notebook

10. What amazes/surprises/angers you
9. Quotes or inspiring passages from books/poems/music
8. What you notice- those little THOUGHTS that pop in your head!
7. Ideas for stories
6. Snatches of talk you overhear- Facebook posts!
5. Memories
4. Lists
3. Photos, articles, cards, post cards, ticket stubs or other artifacts
2. Your own sketches, drawings or doodles
1. What you wonder about

**There are 3 ways to use a Writer's Notebook:**

- 1) Random Gatherings of SEEDS for Writing
- 2) Specific Gatherings- Collecting ideas/information related to a specific writing task or genre
- 3) Trying Things Out- as directed by teacher

## Notebook Implementation...

- Teachers will spend some time “talking-up” the Writer’s Notebook and showing off their own of course!
  - Modeling how to use the Writer’s Notebook.
  - Counting down the days until the kids receive their Writer’s Notebooks.
- Show kids different kinds of notebooks! Let them bring in a notebook of their choosing or provide composition books and let them decorate.
- Launch Writer’s Notebooks with enthusiasm in your classroom.
